



How to ask questions



- Like in English, questions in Spanish start with an interrogative (like "why" or "who").
- The word order in a question is different than in a normal sentence.
- Questions in Spanish always begin with an inverted question mark and end with a standard question mark: ¿...?











Spanish

- ¿Quién?
- ¿Qué?
- ¿Dónde?
- ¿Cuándo?
- ¿Por qué?

English

- Who?
- What?
- Where?
- When?
- Why?





Interrogatives



Spanish

- ¿Cómo?
- ¿Cuál?
- ¿Cuánto, Cuánta?
- *¿Cuántos, Cuántas?
 - *These change in number and gender to match the noun they modify.

English

- How?
- What? or Which?
- How much?
- How many?



Some examples



- ¿Quién es la dentista? Who is the dentist?
- ¿Cómo se escribe tu nombre? How do you spell your name?
- ¿Cuántos libros hay? How many books are there?





Word order in questions



- INTERROGATIVE > VERB > SUBJECT
 - ¿Cuál es tu número de teléfono?
- You can also form a question by putting question marks around a statement.
 - ¿Eres estudiante? *Are you a student?*
 - ¿Estudia biología? Do you study biology?
 - ¿Y tú? And you?





How to answer questions



- If the answer to a question is affirmative, you use Si + verb.
 - ¿Eres estudiante? **Sí, soy** estudiante. *Yes, I am a student.*
- If the answer to the question is negative, use No, no + verb.
 - ¿Estudia biología? **No, no estudio** biología. *No, I don't study biology.*



Some things to remember

- When you use these words to form questions, they always have accents.
 - ¿Cómo te llamas? How do you call yourself? or What is your name?
- Sometimes interrogatives are used with prepositions. If there is a preposition (a, de, con, para, etc.), it goes before the question word.
 - ¿De dónde eres? Where are you from?
 - ¿Con quién vas al cine? Who are you going to the movies with?
